### **CEO REPORT**

Through our strategic review process this year, we also felt it important to revisit our values. These core values will guide all our work here at Sprout, and I believe we've nailed it in terms of articulating what we stand for, how we work and what is important to us. ### **CROSS POLLINATE 2023**

What an amazing couple of days we had at this year's Cross Pollinate.

Day one was at the fabulous Moonah Arts Centre. We had six live presentations, three recorded videos, one panel discussion and four facilitated sessions, all centred around the theme of financial viability. The following day had us on farm, at four separate locations, where we spoke to producers with incredible stories to share. The overall event was a wonderful example of the power of knowledge sharing, and of people coming together to learn and support one another.

As you can imagine there's a lot of planning that goes into Cross Pollinate and in the blink of an eye it's over. This year we were fortunate enough to be in a location for day that we could record the audio of all the sessions. This is now sitting on the Sprout Hub as an ongoing resource for our members to access into the future.

The second day of the conference we were out and about on 4 farms across the Coal Valley region. Kicking us off at Rocky Top/Felds Farm, then to Coaldale Walnuts, Littlewood Berry Farm and finishing off at Ripple Farm in their incredible on farm shed and event space. The sharing of knowledge, conversations about succession planning, regenerative agriculture, scale, diversification and more were so worthwhile, with many participants commenting how much they valued the open and honest discussions with the host farmers.

As always, thank you to everyone that made the event what it was. From the volunteers to the team at the Moonah Arts Centre, our amazing speakers who committed to the process wholeheartedly, to the farms we visited on day two to everyone that attended, you all made it a successful and special occasion.

The last of the field days for 2022 were held at Early Bird Farm, Hillwood Fresh Food, and Old Orchard Farm. As part of these field days, we held workshops with Libby Graham (South Arm Farm), Celia Laverton (Regenerative Agriculture Network Tasmania), and Matt Tack (Our Mates' Farm).

We also took the participants to visit other farms. In August 2022 we headed to Summerlea Farm with Patreena, Josh and Jordan, where we spoke to Liz and Rick about their farming journey, and their transition from selling cattle through sales yards to marketing beef direct to consumer. In September 2022 we took Mel, Luke, Coral, Nick, Jenna, Zeb and Christie to visit Fat Carrot Farm and Broom & Brine.

At the end of the year all six participants attended the Growing Good dinner event where they received graduation certificates.



### **SPROUT PRODUCER PROGRAM**

Growing Good was also the stage for inducting the 2023 cohort. All 6 producers were in attendance, meeting each other for the first time – this was no doubt an overwhelming experience for them, yet a great springboard to kick start the participation in the program the following year.

Having seen the benefits of visiting other farms in 2022, we altered the format of the 2023 program slightly to allow for more farm tours. In the first half of 2023 we visited 19 farms, including all 6 of the participant's properties, meeting a range of farmers from all over the state. We've seen some great outcomes, with participants hearing from experienced farmers, visiting enterprises they were interested in, and establishing networks.

Workshops were then conducted online each month, with guest speakers including Soil Health Consultant Robin Tait, Nick Ritar (Milkwood Permaculture), Yolanda Hanusch (NRM South), and Brendan Leys (Farm Household Case office – Services Australia).

Our aim with this program is to support farmers to find their feet and to move forward to thrive. We want to capacity build in this sector of agriculture and ensure there are many more producers of this scale, selling into our local food system in Tasmania.













### **GROWING GOOD**

Growing Good 2022 was our inaugural fundraising dinner, and boy did it go off with a bang!

We had over 100 guests who all enjoyed an experience like no other, where they heard from keynote speaker Ashley Huntington, listened to stories from our Small Producer of the Year Kim & Dan from Fork it Farm, dined on some of the most amazing produce cooked by a team of sensational chefs from our incredible community here in Tassie.

We raised over \$20,000 from this event, which was an incredible achievement given it was our first crack!

We want to see this event become a well known fundraising event, that can generate excitement, recognition for our farmers and their amazing produce and funds for Sprout to keep doing the work that we do for the local Tassie food system.











### **ADVOCACY**

The connections we have with this sector of farming, coupled with the act of listening and creating a culture of an open door policy, enables us to know when there are issues or opportunities, and to take them to the appropriate 'table'.

Throughout the year, Sprout has sat as a representative of our farmers on various groups.

**Tasmanian Agricultural Coordination Group** - a State Government led group including statewide stakeholders, Federal and State Government, transport, productivity and more. Sprout is there to listen and ask questions of those around the table, and also is given an opportunity to table any thoughts or concerns we feel are poignant given the experiences of our farmers.

**Forum of Rural Stakeholders** - this group is led by Rural Business Tasmania and is a stakeholder driven agenda. Once again, Sprout is there to listen, ask questions and table any thoughts.

**Meetings with State Government** - Jen has built strong communication lines and relationships with both the current Liberal Minister for Agriculture Honorable Jo Palmer MP as well as the Shadow Agricultural Labor Minister Janie Finlay MP.

We have also collaborated with and assisted other organisations with projects that affect local farmers. A few examples are:

- **RMCG** looking at new information from our Sprout survey to inform their work on defining what a 'small-scale commercial farmer' looks like, and their work on agritourism as well.
- **Affairs of State and NTDC** providing feedback on the needs of small scale farmers when they are working towards a freight aggregation solution for non-pallet sized produce that needs cold supply chain provision.

We would like to encourage all of you - farmers, members and non-members, to contact us if you have an idea, an issue to raise or feel you need help with something. We may not have the answers, but we are keen to listen and to see if we can collaborate to find a way the move forward.





### **FINANCES**

It should be noted that the financial results for this year are shown on a cash accounting basis, as Sprout has transitioned from accrual to cash for the FY22/23. Due to this transition, there are some adjustments that have affected how some of our expenses appear for the FY 22/23, that were previously being accrued.

These reports have not been reviewed by the auditor at this stage. Audited financials will be conducted during November 2023 and will be made available on our Sprout website.

The board has continued to prudently and strategically manage the financial capacity and resources of Sprout in the FY23 period and with a continued commitment to bringing in further mixed stream revenue during FY24, as per our two year goal of no more than 50% of revenue coming from government sources by 2024.

Sprout has made a modest profit for the FY23, and has secured a new grant from Sustainable Table fund worth \$55,000 which gives a definite level of certainty for FY 24. There is a strong possibility of this grant being renewed for the following years FY25 and FY 26. There will remain a need to continue to seek out the support of other corporate sponsors and community donations. Work is being undertaken to bring in funds through the auspice arrangement with Sustainable Table Fund.

It is anticipated that Sprout will finish the FY24 in a favourable position.
